TRAP, NEUTER, RETURN...IT WORKS

Trap, neuter, return (TNR) was first practiced in the United Kingdom and Denmark in the 1960's. TNR programs were first proposed and adopted in the United States in the early 1990's. Caretakers humanely trap stray and feral cats already living outdoors. They are brought to a clinic, where they are anesthetized, given a physical examination, vaccinated, and spayed or neutered. Ear tipping (a method first approved by the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons in England) is performed on each cat as a means of identifying those that have been sterilized. Any medical conditions found on physical examination are treated as needed. Kittens and tame strays are placed in temporary foster care or homes whenever possible. The caretakers manage colonies of healthy feral cats that are returned to their outdoor homes, where they are being fed and provided with shelter.

- eliminates or reduces nuisance behaviors like urine spraying, yowling, and fighting
- reduces the number of cats and kittens brought into local shelters. People benefit too...



FACTS AND TRIVIA ABOUT CATS

The Maine Coon cat is America's only natural breed of domestic feline.

Cats purr at about 26 cycles per second, the same frequency as an idling diesel engine. Domestic cats purr both when inhaling and exhaling.

In relationship to their body size, cats have the largest eyes of any mammal.

Both humans and cats have identical regions in the brain responsible for emotion.

Six-toed kittens are so common in Boston and surrounding areas of Massachusetts that experts consider it an established mutation.

A cat spends nearly 30% of her life grooming herself.

Cats lose almost as much fluid in the saliva when grooming themselves as they do through urination.
